Women in Sport

Women in Sport have recently been commissioned to run a research project to gain a better understanding of teenage girls experience and perception of parks and open spaces in the city. The research has a particular focus on how being outside supports young women's mental and physical well-being and increases their opportunity to be active.

There has been a particular focus on three parks in the city – Jesus Green, Nuns Way and Trumpington Rec – and over a weekend in April local young women took a walk around the spaces and talked about what they like and how they feel each park could be improved. The Women in Sport team were impressed by the young women's very thoughtful input which will feed into their research, and will play a part in creating more inclusive parks for all users
